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

Turn right/east on Cave Hill Road and continue about 1.3 miles to the top of the hill.

2. Brief land description

Address: Cave Hill Road, Leverett, MA 01054

Acreage: 102 acres

Structures: None

Physical Description: 102 acres on the west side of top of Cave Hill Road. Eastern portion is rolling/hilly; the higher western (larger) portion is a series of north-south ledges/cliffs.

Special Habitats: Two certified Vernal Pools (third Vernal Pool has been submitted for certification); headwaters of at least 4 seasonal streams; diverse forest habitats from wetlands to ledges.

Special species: Bird inventory not complete, but 20 species of nesting forest birds were documented, deer common, porcupines winter in overhanging ledges.

Special views: View east from above the first series of cliffs (just off the Upper Cliff Trail) of the Peace Pagoda and Brushy Mountain; view from the southwest cliffs to the southeast of Brushy Mountain and Joshua Hill; view within the property of cliffs from the western section of the Cave Hill Loop Trail.

Special other:


Property abuts a 111-acre Conservation Restriction to the southwest (held by MA DCR) which in turn abuts a 130-acre Conservation Area owned by MA DFW.


The Property includes a series of north-south ridges. The rocks that make up these cliffs mark an important geological boundary between a microcontinent that was once part of Africa and rocks formed on the North American continental margin.

Long history of land use includes Native American ceremonial landscape and being part of the Town Farm (1866-1890).

Property has established, well-used trails. A new entrance trail and parking lot will provide continued public access.






Cave Hill Conservation Area: Orthophoto




Cave Hill Conservation Area: Topo



Cave Hill Conservation Area: Contour




Cave Hill Conservation Area: NHESP/TNC BioMass2

VP = Vernal Pools




4. Brief History

History of the Cave Hill Conservation Area

This property has a long history of use. Leverett falls within the area of the Pocumtuck federation, one of the Algonquin-speaking Tribes in New England, whose area encompassed the Connecticut River Valley in what is now Massachusetts. There are a number of confirmed encampment areas within Leverett that are listed with the Massachusetts Historical Commission, one within approximately a mile of the Cave Hill Conservation Area. Identified by the National Register of Historic Places in a 2008 eligibility decision¹, all of Leverett falls within an area identified as a Tribal ceremonial district based in Turner's Falls. Representatives of the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head (Aquinnah) and the Narragansett Tribe Historic Preservation Offices have identified numerous ceremonial landscape stone structure features in Leverett².


Stone features typical of ceremonial landscapes have been identified on the Cave Hill Conservation Area property. Mapping of these features is underway on the property in order to identify ceremonial features in conjunction with Tribal Historic Preservation Office representatives.

Cave Hill Road was not one of the earliest roads in Leverett. On the 1794 Town Plan map, which shows some land features and roads (typically not named), the roads now known as Montague Road and Jackson Hill

Road are present. Cave Hill Road does not appear until the 1830 Town Plan map.



1794 Town Plan Map. Note that the dotted lines on the map refer to roads, while the solid lines indicate streams


On the 1830 Town Plan map, additional roads that connected Leverett Center to both North Leverett and Moores Corner are seen. What is now the southwest end of Rattlesnake Gutter was at that time the beginning of Cave Hill. After passing the farmsteads (now #6 and #13 Rattlesnake Gutter), Cave Hill Road headed uphill


to the north where it ended at the junction of Jackson Hill and Hemenway Roads. The home of Richard Montague near the junction was used as a meetinghouse, represented by a church on the map. (Rattlesnake Gutter Road was not constructed until later in the 1830's.)

Information gained from deed research indicates that Moses Graves, who owned a parcel that probably included part of the current Cave Hill Conservation Area prior to 1803, was an active purchaser of land being sold for taxes beginning around 1788. Moses was one of the selectmen elected at the organizational meeting for Leverett on March 24, 1774³. He sold the

property to his son Enos Graves in 1803. His son also acquired quite a bit of land in his life, in some cases, taking land for failure to pay mortgage debt. Enos sold the same land to his son Kellogg, with the deed signed in 1816, but not registered until 1864 - after Enos's death.) The 1858 Walling Map, which included both house locations and names, listed K. Graves on Cave Hill Road. The Walling Map shows the extension of Cave Hill Road from the junction of Jackson Hill and Hemenway Roads to North Leverett, meeting Old Mill Road before it crossed the Saw Mill River.

Kellogg Graves sold land, which was probably a combination of his father's/grandfather's property and additional land he had purchased, to the Town of Leverett in 1868, to be used as the Town Farm, as shown on the 1871 Beers Atlas Map. The Town Farm sought to provide care for the indigent population of the town, with the residents working the land to pay for the farm's operations. The system did not work well, though, as many of the residents were physically unable to work; When the farmhouse burned in 1889, it was not rebuilt. None of the outbuildings remain, but the well is preserved at 53 Cave Hill Road.





The Town of Leverett sold the land to Edward F. Ingram in 1890, who then sold the land to Ralph N. Marvell in 1915. The land passed to Ralph's children, Pascal H. and Alberta L. (Marvell) Cronen. During their ownership, sections of the larger property where sold, including the house lot. W.D. Cowls Lumber Company bought the land in 1960, at which point the deeds indicate that various other sections were sold and perhaps some sections added. W. D. Cowls sold the 110-acre property to Gary L. and Joanne B. Jensen in 1973.

Barbed wire on the west boundary is a clear indication that the land was once pastureland sometime after the invention of barbed wire in the 1870's. Under Cowls Lumber Company and Jensen ownership, the land was periodically logged. There is no indication that physical structures, including barns or outbuildings, were ever present on this land.

JENSEN, husband and wife, both of 220 Ridge Trail, Bozeman, Montana, for consideration paid, and in consideration of TWO HUNDRED TEN THOUSAND AND NO ONE-HUNDREDTHS (\$210,000.00) DOLLARS grant to the CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR THE TOWN OF LEVERETT, a Massachusetts municipality, having a principal place of business at 9 Montague Road, Leverett, Franklin County, Massachusetts, with QUITCLAIM COVENANTS
